

Skills to Practice to Support Success

How can you support your child at home with these?

Skills to Practice: Daily Independence

Practice the skills your child will use at school so that they are independent at:

- Putting on and taking off shoes
- Putting on and taking off coats
- Opening lunch containers
- Zipping up backpack









Skills to Practice: Washrooms









Practice using public washrooms so that your child is independent at:

- Zippers/buttons
- Flushing
- Washing hands

Skills to Practice: Early Literacy

Practice early literacy skills so that your child can:

- Recognize their name when written
- Print their own name
- Identify letters in your community
- Use pictures to tell a story
- Recognize important words in the community and their family







Skills to Practice: Early Numeracy









Practice early numeracy skills so that your child can:

- Count objects in your home
- Create patterns
- Sort objects into different groups
- Recognize numbers in your community
- Recognize numbers on dice and playing cards

Skills to Practice: Fine Motor Strength and Control









Do activities with your child that support fine motor skills, such as:

- Creating drawings with pencil, crayon and markers
- Cutting paper with scissors
- Playing with play-doh and plasticine
- Pinching clothespins to move pompoms

- Regular Size Backpack
- Snack
- Leak-proof water bottle
- Indoor shoes (with velcro closing or slip on)
- Extra change of clothes including socks/underwear in a ziplock bag
